On another topic, as you may know there is some discussion in Congress today about the possibility of having limits on the number of terms that a Senator or House Member can serve.¹ This would require an amendment to the US Constitution. Here is an argument in favor:

Q23. When a Member of Congress remains in office for a few terms, they accumulate advantages over any challenger--they have more name recognition and are able to raise much more money. In fact, incumbents win re-election races more than 90 percent of the time. There may be much better candidates out there who never get a chance.

Q25. Because incumbents are so secure, they don't need to be attentive to their constituents and increasingly lose touch with the people back home. If we were to have term limits, we would have more open-seat races in which both candidates would really have to earn the votes of the people, including by paying attention to their views.

Q26. Term limits would greatly reduce the number of Members of Congress who have deep experience and knowledge of the issues. They also have well-developed relationships that make it more possible to negotiate deals. Research has shown that, with term limits, representatives are not more responsive to constituents.² It is great to have fresh blood, but seasoned Members have a lot to offer as well.
