Survey Methodology

Sample Provided by: QuantifyAl

Field Dates: July 5 – August 13, 2025

Sample Size: 649 Adults OH-7 & OH-13 Combined

OH-7: 326

OH-13: 323

Confidence Interval: +/- 4%

Survey designed by: University of Maryland's

Program for Public Consultation

Weighting:

The sample was pre-stratified and weighted by age, gender, race, income, education, and home ownership to reflect the adult population of OH-7 and OH-13. The sample has a roughly equal distribution of Rs and Ds.

Survey Design

Respondents were given the opportunity to change spending: Adjust spending levels for 34 areas of the discretionary budget, as well as Medicaid and SNAP (food stamps)

And change, adopt or remove taxes

Respondents were shown in real-time the effect of their decisions on the 2024 budget deficit (\$1.9 trillion)


Respondents were also given **briefings and evaluated pro and con arguments** for each section, which were reviewed by experts on each side of the debate

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR


We have been running huge deficits for years now, putting the national debt on a path to unsustainable heights...

ARGUMENT AGAINST


More important than reducing the deficit is for the government to continue making investments that ensure that the economy continues to grow...

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR


Too often, people think government is the solution, when it really is the problem...

ARGUMENT AGAINST


We shouldn't just cut government for its own sake. As a share of the economy, the federal government is at about the average for the last four decades...

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR


When making up a budget, we must not scrimp on investing in the future, because such investments bring big returns later on...

ARGUMENT AGAINST


Investment in the future is important, but the private sector is much better at it than government...

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR


The Pentagon keeps thinking we need to be the world's policeman, leading us to have this huge defense budget...

34 areas of spending, presented with their 2024 budget.

For each area respondents set their own spending levels.

Major spending categories:

- Transportation
- Federal Law Enforcement
- Scientific and Medical Research
- Foreign Aid
- Foreign Relations
- Environment and Conservation
- Energy

- Housing
- Job Training
- Education
- Farming
- National Defense
- Veterans

R & D AGREEMENT ON DECREASING SPENDING

Majorities of Republicans and Democrats did NOT agree on any decreases to spending.

Bare majorities of Republicans decreased:


- Foreign development aid (51%)
- Subsidies for agricultural corporations (51%)

Among Democrats, no spending area was decreased by a majority.

NOTE ON DEFENSE SPENDING

2024 Budget: \$860 billion (the largest discretionary spending item)

No majority recommended increasing or decreasing



MEDICAID & SNAP

Medicaid

In 2024, spending was \$608 billion.

What do you think federal spending on Medicaid should be for 2025?



Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program

In 2024, spending was \$100 billion.

SNAP provides monthly food credits averaging \$187 per person to low-income individuals and families, with eligibility based on income and work requirements.

What do you think federal spending on SNAP should be for 2025?



Reducing Taxes

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR


For the economy to grow, it is important to reduce tax rates... Lower tax rates will energize the economy...



Reducing Taxes

ARGUMENT AGAINST

It is unwise and shortsighted to cut taxes when we have a major deficit... It is a myth that lower taxes always help the economy...



Taxes for Higher Incomes

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR


Over the last several decades, the wealth of most Americans has barely grown at all. Meanwhile, the wealth of the people in the top brackets has grown by leaps and bounds...



Taxes for Higher Incomes

ARGUMENT AGAINST

The people at the top already pay a lot... people with high incomes play an important role in the economy...

CHANGING EXISTING TAXES

INDIVIDUAL INCOME TAXES


In 2018 the government enacted tax reductions...

Options:

- Reduce them below the current rates
- Keep the current rates
- Go back to the higher 2017 rates
- Increase them above the 2017 rates

Income Tax Rates

Raise taxes back to 2017 rates for income:



Capital Gains & Dividends


Capital gains and dividends are taxed differently – often less – than income from wages or salaries.

Options:

- Raise taxes on capital gains and dividends, by taxing them same as ordinary income
- Keep taxes the same

Capital Gains & Dividends

Tax earnings as ordinary income for people with income:



Estate tax is a tax on inherited wealth.

In 2009, it applied only to inherited wealth over \$3.5 million for individuals and \$7 million for couples, with a top tax rate was 45%.

In 2011, it was changed so it applied only to inherited wealth over \$5.5 million (\$11 million for couples), with a top tax rate of 40%.

In 2018, it was changed so it only applied to inherited wealth over \$14 million (\$28 million for couples).

Options:

- Eliminate it
- Keep the current rate
- Raise it back to 2011 levels
- Raise it back to 2009 levels

Estate Tax Keep current Raise to at least 2011 rates: rates and applies to >\$5.5 million do not **Eliminate** Keep same top tax rate of 40% <u>eliminate</u> 88% 12 51 37 Ohio 7&13 81% 19 **37** 45 Republicans 94% 40 54 **Democrats**

Corporate Tax

Tax on their profits (income minus spending)


Rates have been steadily decreased since 1950s when the top rate was 50%

In 2018, it was changed to a flat rate of 21%

Lowering the Corporate Tax Rate

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR


Lowering the corporate tax rate will boost economic growth...




Raising the Corporate Tax Rate

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

Large corporations and their owners have grown wealthier, while the government deficit has grown larger...



CORPORATE TAX RATE



REVENUES

ADOPTING NEW TAXES

Proposal to impose a tax of:

- 2% on the amount of wealth over \$50 million, and
- 3% on the amount of wealth over \$1 billion.


The 2% tax would affect about 120,000 households.

The 3% tax would affect about 800 households.

Raise \$200 billion in revenues.


ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

The ultra-rich benefit the most from our economy, so they should pay their fair share. But in fact, billionaires pay lower tax rates than many workers...




ARGUMENT AGAINST

A wealth tax punishes the successful, who already contribute more in total taxes than everyone else. It will discourage investment and job creation...




Impose an extra annual tax of 2% on wealth over \$50 million, and 3% on wealth over \$1 billion.



Financial Transactions Tax

Tax on each trade of a stock, bond or derivative by a percent of the value being traded.




REVENUE

TAX-RELIEF MEASURES

Eliminate Taxes on Overtime Pay

If a person makes \$20 an hour, and they work overtime, they receive \$20 PLUS an additional \$10 an hour. Under this proposal, they would not pay income tax on that extra \$10.


This proposal would reduce revenues by about \$60 billion.



Eliminate Taxes on Tips

Many workers in the service industry earn tips as part of their income. For some, especially workers in restaurants, tips make up a significant amount of their income.

This proposal would reduce revenues by about \$7 billion.



THE PROBLEM: <u>DISSATISFACTION WITH GOVERNMENT</u>

How many Americans say that Members of Congress take into account the views of the majority of their constituents LESS than they should?



SOLVING THE PROBLEM: A NEW METHOD FOR DEMOCRACY

- 1. <u>Learn what policy solutions the majority of the public</u> recommends, by conducting a survey of a representative sample of citizens
- 2. <u>Have people deliberate on the majority's recommended policy solutions</u>, by hosting an in-person Citizen Engagement event
- 3. Have people decide whether they want to <u>endorse the</u> <u>majority's policy recommendations</u>

A NEW METHOD FOR DEMOCRACY

4. Communicating to our elected officials:

- a) findings of the survey
- b) in-person deliberations and policy endorsements
- c) the desire for Congress to take the views of the majority into account more when making decisions
